Bethel Observes Pride Month MARRIAGE EQUALITY DOCUMENTARY TO BE SHOWN

June is Pride Month in recognition of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) individuals and communities, and Bethel will be observing the occasion in a number of ways:

- Bethel is one of numerous faith communities joining together in the 8th annual Northern Virginia Interfaith Pride Worship Service Thursday, June 7 at 7 p.m. at Little River UCC in Annandale.
- A number of our members will be participating with other metropolitan-area UCC congregations in the **Saturday**,

June 7 DC Pride Parade in the Dupont Circle area of Northwest Washington.

• Bethel's Outreach Committee will host a screening of the acclaimed documentary *Bridegroom*, dealing with issues surrounding marriage equality, on **Sunday**, **June 22**, from 6 to 8 p.m.

Bridegroom is the story of two young men in a committed relationship that is cut tragically short by an accidental death; it poignantly tells how people without legal protections of marriage can find themselves completely shut out and ostracized.

A panel discussion will follow the film's screening. Panelists include:

- Sharon Ringe, a UCC minister and professor at Wesley Theological Seminary;
- Phil Hicks, former Board President of the Metro DC Chapter of PFLAG (Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) and current Virginia Advocacy Chair; and
- David Farmer, a member of Ravensworth Baptist Church in Annandale who is active in the Reformation Project, which educates Christians in supporting and affirming LGBT people.

Celebrating God's Diversity of Love

Bethel United Church of Christ is an Open and Affirming congregation, which means that "no mat-

ter where you are on life's journey you are welcome here." And we truly mean everyone; but especially we are open and affirming to members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered (LGBT) community, their friends and family, and those for whom church has often been a place where they were not welcome or conditionally welcomed. Many of our brothers and sisters who love differently have been hurt by the church. It is because of the history of abuse and exclusion for LGBT brothers and sisters from the church that actively welcoming is so important.

For me, as a parent of young children, being in a congregation where I know my children will hear the consistent message that God loves all people and celebrates the diversity of families is why I treasure being part of an Open and Affirming congregation.

There are many reasons and experiences that lead to people to have PRIDE in Bethel being an Open and Affirming congregation so I invited you to share your stories:

Becky Ballenger wrote:

I'm proud to be a member of Bethel UCC. I don't really know where I should begin but I am willing to try because I know Bethel and the Lord are with me now. You

see, June 23rd will be my oneyear "rebirth day" due to the open and affirmative feelings I get from the Bethel community. The spark that ignited the fire within me to accept Jesus as my savior came the first day that my partner Cheryl and I met with Pastor Kristen. The fire became a blaze when I started talking with the congregation; I knew Bethel was "my place," my true beginning of the journey.

I can't remember a day of my life that I wasn't "different." I wasn't resentful or really sad about it. It just was. Of course I couldn't discuss my difference with my family. Being "God fearing" people, my family always preached that certain "differences" like mine meant burning in Hell. The one good thing they told me was that you needed to "talk to God" about everything. I did. I told him everything. I waited for answers. Sometimes they came and sometimes they didn't. It just was. I convinced myself that I didn't need a church to speak to or find God. I mean, God is everywhere, right?

Something was missing.

It wasn't until I joined Bethel that my eyes and ears and heart opened for the first time. My eyes opened to see that no matter who you are with all your "differences," you're welcome with "great" hugs and support and love. My ears where opened for the first time to hear the conviction and love that Jesus gave for so many people. My heart was opened by the strength in numbers from the congregation and the grace of the Lord not to miss my second chance. Now I can truly say "I am a foot soldier for our Lord" with the blessings of "my church family" at Bethel. Thank you for having the patience and love to walk with someone "different."

Ralph Buglass wrote:

I confess I did not seek out an Open and Affirming church; when I first came to Bethel I didn't even know it was a specific designation. But I soon came to view Bethel's status as an "ONA" church to be very meaningful and important.

I already had come to sense that the United Church of

Christ denomination proclaimed a far more progressive theology and general "open-ness"— open to a broader interpretation and understanding of the Bible—than Methodism, the religious setting which I was brought up in but long lapsed from.

Being "open and affirming"—with its message of not mere acceptance but total embrace and validation of others whose sexual orientation is simply not the prevailing one in society—was a clear mark of

Being an Open and Affirming church means that we are as safe place for children of LGBT parents to grow and learn that their moms or dads are made by God, loved by God and called to share their gifts in the world just like everyone else. Being and Open and Affirming church means we celebrate God's love in all its expressions.

Each day, visions and dreams are created in the hearts of many in the United Church of Christ. Through this special offering, they can become a reality. Right here in our conference support from Strengthen the Church has had major impact. Early on December 3 a fire destroyed the century-old building that was Lazarus UCC in Lineboro, Maryland. "The church is our home, and we've lost that. But there is a congregation here that still loves God and wants to worship." Said Lazarus' pastor, the Rev. Sam Chamelin.

They also want to serve. Lazarus' Re:Deem Food Pantry began serving the community a year ago on the third Saturday of each month. There were concerns in the community about what would happen during the holiday season because of the fire. But on the pantry's oneyear anniversary, its temporary location was stocked and open.

The outpouring of support from the surrounding Carroll County was a confirmation of the church's impact in the community. Calls came in from every church within a 20-mile radius offering space for





worship donations and food to stock the pantry.

While the 200 members of Lazarus worship in the Lineboro fire hall, they envision a new building which could incorporate Lazarus' still-standing exterior brick walls and soup kitchen to expand the food pantry. "The building now looks like a sign of death, " said Pastor Chamelin. "But [the food pantry] reminds us that we're alive and well, and can still be a church."

That's the vision of the Strengthen the Church offering... growing churches that offer a continuing testament to our stillspeaking God.

Bethel to Host Arlington Interfaith Council This Month

On Monday, June 16 at 7 p.m. Bethel will host the Arlington Interfaith Council (AIC)'s June meeting.

AIC consists of representatives from 48 Arlington faith communities and 18 Helping Hands agencies that provide direct services to people in need. Contri-

butions from member congregations provide grants so that agencies can help the homeless, feed the hungry, assist ex-offenders and victims of domestic violence, and put supplies in the backpacks of

homeless children.

AIC's mission is to provide tangible religious witness in the community through promotion of understanding and cooperation among member congregations and to develop and support programs to alleviate

> suffering and promote justice for residents of Arlington County.

The monthly meetings are an opportunity for members to learn about community issues, share strategies, get to know one another and recruit volunteers.

We are seeking help to set up, provide light refreshments and clean up following the AIC meeting June 16. If you are able to help please speak with Bill Graver or Judy Lipman, our Social Concerns co-chairs.
