Faith in a Broken World

We live in a hurting world; a world filled with violence, pain, suffering and injustice. If we forgot this

fact as we enjoyed vacation with family and friends, time on the beach or pool, a hot dog at the fair or a good book on a quite summer afternoon, we were sure to remember when we saw the news. This summer's news was filled with stories that remind us we live in a broken world. A Malaysian Airlines Boeing 777 exploded over insurgent-held east Ukraine on July 17, killing all 298 on board. As Israeli ground troops withdrew from the Gaza strip some 2,000 people, mostly Palestinian, lay dead. As the largest known Ebola outbreak continues to spread, the World Health Organization expects that more than 20,000 people could be afflicted. An 18 year old unarmed black man was shot six times by a white police officer in Ferguson, Missouri, leading to sometimes violent demonstrations in the black community. The list is long. We live in a broken world.

As we look toward a new programmatic year at Bethel, we recognize that our faith does not exist in a bubble. It exists in the reality of our surrounding broken world and our deep yearning to find answers to questions like: Why does God allow suffering? How can people of faith respond to violence with violence? How does God call us to respond to injustice in our world?

In worship we will not shy away for the challenges and hard parts of life or scripture, but rather seek God in the midst of the full human experience. This fall you will notice that the worship elements continues to change from week to week as we seek meaning and deeper relationships with one another and the living God.

As we walk side by side on our journey of faith we engage in faith formation programs that deepen our wisdom of the risen Christ. Through our partnership with Arlington Forest UMC and Arlington Church of (continued on page 2)

Continuing the Conversation on Marriage

We had two productive discussions around marriage equality in July. The first touched on Biblical models of marriage, the ways practices in multiple areas of life have changed since the Bible was written, and the need to accept and love each other. Some in the group indicated they had not yet come to firm conclusions about marriage equality. Some felt that marriage should be about love and commitment

between two people, and couples getting married in our church should be given the support and affirmation to help their marriages succeed.

The second group discussed the role of our church in advocating for marriage equality, whether within

our own church, the UCC more broadly, or the Commonwealth of Virginia as a whole. The group felt that, if our church is Open and Affirming, we need to affirm all aspects of that covenant—we can't draw a line that allows access to some parts of church life but not others. The group thought it would be best to look back at our own Open and Affirming covenant, first to determine

whether we explicitly addressed marriage at that time and, if not, to consider whether we might be able to modify the language to include marriage.

On the basis of these discussions, I have obtained from the UCC several models of covenant language that address marriage in some form. We have also taken a look back at our own covenant language, which does not address marriage, but could be easily modified to incorporate marriage. I will work on some possible language for people to consider as we move into a second round of meetings (see box above). I hope that we will have as good attendance at these two sessions as we had at the first two, and look forward to continuing this conversation with you all.
