Let's Go Fishing! BY PASTOR KRISTEN CURLEE

At Bethel United Church of Christ we go outside our walls to extend compassionate care to our neigh-

bors in Arlington and around the world. We donate and bag groceries at AFAC (see page 7, Oct. 3rd item) and we join in the CROP hunger walk with Christians from across Arlington (see page 6, bottom). At OAR (see page 6, top) we learn about the injustices of the prison system especially for our black brothers, and we head downtown during DC Pride to show our dedication to an extravagant welcome for our LGBTQ brothers and sisters. We are not an inward-focused church, yet again and again the questions arise: What can we do to reach more people in our community? What can we do to attract more visitors? How do we become, as Jesus calls us to be, fishers of people?

Last month I attended a Next Generation Leadership Initiative week of continuing education. I traveled to meet 30 other UCC clergy in their twenties and thirties at the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Kansas City, Kansas for their Leadership Institute. I'll admit that I was skeptical when I boarded the plane. What could I learn from a 20,000-member church on the plains of Kansas to bring back to our vibrant, small, progressive thinking and traditional worshiping church on the edge of our Nation's Capital?

The United Methodist Church of the Resurrection is a young church started by their current Senior Pastor, Adam Hamilton, 24 years ago in the parlor of a funeral home. Pastor Adam's vision and mandate from the UMC was to create a church where "nonreligious and nominally religious become deeply committed Christians." It is an evangelical mission, one that I feared could become focused on growth at all costs, a numbers (continued on page 2)

focused ministry. I was repeatedly surprised with how the Church of the Resurrection lives out its purpose in a way that is humble, honest, questioning, welcoming and missional.

From the time the Church of the Resurrection was started until they reached 500 members, Pastor Adam visited the home of each visitor who left a name and address on a signup sheet. He always prefaced the visit with "I don't want to come in," to help reduce the anxiety for someone he visited, but simply left a coffee mug as 'thank you' for visiting. They found people came back because they learned that their visit was noticed and appreciated. I am committed to live out this practice with each new visitor this fall. Let's buy some UCC coffee mugs.

During Hunger Action Month in the fall, the Church of Resurrection gives each member of their congregation five grocery bags to deliver to five neighbors. They ask members to tell their neighbors the church's name and that they are collecting food for the food drive. When the members come back a few days later to pick up the food, they leave a thank you note on the door with information about that Sunday's service. This not only says, "oh, by the way, there is a church up the street and we'd like you to come," but it also says "this place is a church that lives out their faith through Christian service." Could we expand our mission to AFAC while also spreading the word about our church?

Like many churches, Christmas Eve at the Church of the Resurrection is the biggest night of worship all year. In addition to expensive TV, radio and direct mail invitations, they make signs for their members to put in their windows or on their lawns two weeks before the holidays so that friends and neighbors see information about a nearby service and know there will be a friendly face.

On Christmas Eve they advertise a sermon series to begin in January that they call a "fishing expedition." Jesus calls us to be fishers of people; how do we do that? We think about what questions our friends and family who are "nones" (those who do not affiliate with a church or religion) have and we create a sermon series around that. Then we invite those who come on Christmas Eve to come back. You are here and we have something to draw you back. It's not just worship, but worship that we know will speak to you, because we've listened to our friends and neighbors and hear their struggles. Part of being a place that offers compassionate care is being good listeners and responding to the needs we hear, not just for food and shelter, but also for a Word that feeds and nourishes.

Two years ago on Christmas Eve the Church of the Resurrection advertised a series called "Love, Sex and Marriage" with a short promotional video that talked about the hard parts of relationships and offered some support and guidance for those seeking more. The first Sunday of the series was the largest recorded worship attendance outside of Christmas Eve ever.

Our friends and neighbors who are not part of a church community have questions and longings. What questions have you heard on the hearts and minds of your friends and neighbors? I've asked you what questions you have about faith and the Bible, but now I hope you will help us plan a series that isn't about us, but about our friends and neighbors who are not religious. What might speak to them? What would you be willing to invite them to come to hear?

Thank you for giving me the time away to be with other Christian leaders, to study scripture, to worship and to learn about our call as Christians to reach outside our walls, casting our nets wide so that we might be fishers of people.



Proposed Convental Language on Marriage

We had two more discussion sessions around marriage equality in September, this time looking specifically at possible language that the church may want to adopt. Per the July discussion, we started from our existing Open and Affirming statement. I obtained a number of samples of language used by other UCC churches and folded in what seemed to fit best for Bethel. The addition does not include the word marriage, but specifically states that all will be welcome to join in the covenants of the church, which would include marriage. I included in handouts the full text of some other statements so participants could see some alternative models.

Thus far, the feedback has been positive. As part of the added language, we propose specifically including gender expression and identity, as well as changing our existing language around disability in order to focus affirmatively on the different abilities all may bring to our congregation. The Spiritual Council will discuss this language at a meeting in early November. If there is agreement to proceed at that point, we will

then present the proposed language at the congregational meeting in December.

The proposed new Open and Affirming statement would read as follows:

Bethel United Church of Christ affirms and celebrates that we are all children of God, acknowledges that we all are in need of God's grace, and welcomes diversity in race, ethnicity, mental and physical ability, age, sexual orientation, gender expression and identity, family structure, religious upbringing, and interpretation of scripture. We invite all to share in the full life, ministry, and responsibilities of our church, including: worship, sacraments, rites, covenants, fellowship, leadership, (employment), commitments, blessings and joys. All are welcome as we follow Christ's example of unconditional love and welcome, and seek to serve one another in faith and love.

(Note that "employment" is in parentheses as there has been some discussion around whether this fits with the overall statement.)

Arlington's OAR (Offender Aid and Restoration program), a community-based restorative justice organization, blends compassion and accountability to assist offenders in leading produc-

tive and responsible lives, to the benefit of all.

From October 1 to 31 Bethel will join other churches and organizations in helping OAR collect Christmas gifts for incarcerated parents to give to their children.

Gifts will have handwritten letters from the incarcerated parent. OAR has set a goal of 1,200 gifts for Christmas.



Please bring new and unwrapped toys for children up to age 12 and gift cards for ages 13-18 to Bethel during October. (Suggested price range in both cases is \$5-\$15). I found myself interested in learning more about OAR as I have a college-educated niece who got herself into serious trouble and has just finished a 17-year

prison sentence. Having addressed a drug addiction while in prison and finally, but only after strong advocacy of her uncle, received treatment to stabilize a mental health condition, she now faces the horrendous challenge of finding a job and housing with a felony on her record.

I attended an OAR panel discussion last month and found that OAR works in behalf of the whole system—including the legal system, to prevent so many

> folks from being incarcerated; to improve services within jails and prisons; and to assist with the adjustment in coming back into the community. There are

many volunteer opportunities such as teaching a class in the jail and supervising community service young folks, helping in the office, among others. I invite anyone from Bethel UCC to join me for a one-hour tour at 8 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 16th. Another tour will be given at noon Wednesday, Oct. 22nd with lunch included. OAR is located 1400 North Uhle Street, Suite 704, directly across from the Arlington courthouse. (Call Donna at 703-892-6720 to attend or for more information.)
