Visit the Prisoner BY PASTOR KRISTEN CURLEE



In Matthew's Gospel Jesus reminds us of our responsibility to care for the least of these. When we do, when we care for those on the margins, we are

caring for Jesus. Visit the prisoner, Jesus says. When we visit those in prison, it is as if we are visiting Jesus.

There are many prisoners in need of visits. The rate of prisoners, especially young African American men, is on the rise as it has been for almost a generation. Some are calling it the "new Jim Crow," others are calling it the "schools to prison pipeline." By whatever name, the statistics are troubling and call for a closer examination of the injustices that are at work. This summer at our General Synod, the United Church of Christ approved two resolutions calling for advocacy, education and action to address the growing concerns with our justice system.

I am deeply troubled by the injustice of mass incarceration, of the inequitable sentencing and the barriers to reentry into our society after someone has served time. I pray that our broken system of justice might be transformed. Yet we must do more.

One of the biggest challenges for offenders when they are released from prison is to find legal employment that can sustain a person's livelihood. In addition, after prison many people's safety nets are limited or cut as family and friends separate themselves from the prisoner. The Arlington Office of Aid and Restoration (OAR), a grassroots, local organization dedicated to visiting the prisoner and finding ways to address the plethora of injustice, works diligently to assist with employment and to maintain and repair family ties. This holiday season we can

Prisoners do not have a way to buy presents for family members, but you can help make a difference in the lives of some of these families. You can help make sure that this holiday season is filled with unexpected joy. OAR is collecting new toys for children, infant to 18 years of age, along with \$5 to \$15 gift cards so that some of the prisoners can share Christmas with their children.

This month kicks off the holiday season as we gather around the table and give God thanks for all the blessings in our lives. Then we enter into to our sacred season of waiting as we prepare our hearts and minds for the gift of the Christ child. In this season that can be swept away with preparations, parties and presents, may we be mindful of Jesus' call to care.


Kairos Prison Ministry

Kairos is an international, interdenominational Christian faithbased ministry to incarcerated men, women, youth and their families. It is an offspring of the Cursillo and Emmaus movements which present the Christian faith over three days of talks, activities, music and worship.

The cookies and prayer strips that you provided for this past Kairos weekend are one form of agape, a Greek word for selfless, spiritual love. These are presented to the participants (and the cookies to the whole prison) over the course of the weekend. This agape touches the hearts of the women in a powerful way and is instrumental in breaking down the walls of despair and distrust that are hallmarks of prison life.

I have been involved in Kairos since 2000 at the Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women in Troy, VA. Over the course of the years I have seen the lives of many women transformed by the love and grace that God extends to us all. I will share just one short story: "Mary" participated in a Kairos weekend about eight years ago. She accepted

God's love and forgiveness in to her life and became an inspiration to other residents. Because she had no money to tithe, she tithed her time, spending at least one tenth of her day extending her hand of

Christian fellowship to the most lost of her fellow prisoners. She developed cancer about four years ago and it progressively spread throughout her body. Although she was repeatedly denied her appeal for a compassionate parole, she gracefully accepted that her mission field was to the prison. Mary continued to tithe her time and witnessed from her wheelchair and eventual hospital bed. She died a year ago—and continues to be an inspiration to those whose lives she touched, including mine.

CALLING ALL BAKERS


The holiday season is a perfect time to invite a friend or neighbor to join you for church. The Outreach Committee invites you to bake some
